LOBBYING AND ENDORSEMENT NEWS

The June 17th meeting with **Sen. Cantwell's** aide, **Patrick Eckroth**, was primarily run by **CCL WA Youth!** The 7 high-schoolers and one 8th-grader did an inspiring job. Their "asks" included supporting the **Save Our Future Act** and the **Clean Future Fund**. (The Senator is still focused on updating the **CLEAR Act** at this point, however). They also asked for her to hold a town hall meeting "for future voters." This was well-received.

There may be a meeting with **Senator Murray** on or around June 28th.

There was a meeting with **Rep. Strickland**'s energy staffer **Andrew Ofiebeke** on June 18th. Her primary concern with HR2307 lies with equity issues, so it was good that CCL could relate that the regulatory pause of the old bill is no more. She also sees a need to adopt a more direct "cash back" type of messaging for promoting the bill. **Rep. Strickland** is holding a town hall on June 24th at 6:30 on housing issues and her new bill, **TOD**, for developing equity of housing/transit proximity.

On June 16th, Rep Derek Kilmer met with us in person, from outside the Capital, between votes! He is co-chair of a Bipartisan Working Group which recently heard two speakers on the necessity of carbon pricing. It had a positive effect. He is co-sponsoring several climate bills including Growing Climate Solutions. He appreciates CCL's flagging of certain bills because there are 8,000 of them to study! He is frustrated by the resistance to the infrastructure plan because the provisions don't seem partisan in any way. Was glad to see recent Executive actions and progress in the House. His aide, Katie Allen, arrived later and spoke with us about a meeting or even attending a CCL event during summer recess this August.

Fircrest lobbying news—Councilmember **Shannon Reynolds** officially endorsed HR2307, as did **Blake Surina**, a business owner and former councilmember.
